

### **Clay Brown Induction to the Hall of Fame**

This month we celebrated Clay Brown's Induction into the St. Catharines Sports Hall of Fame.

Two-time Olympian Clayton Brown will be one of five local residents inducted next Wednesday into the St. Catharines Sports Hall of Fame.

"It's a big deal and I have to thank two of the fellows (Richard Crooker and Joel Finley) from the crew (Canadian eight at 1968 Olympics) who suggested I should try and get into the sports hall of fame. I said I didn't know but they said they would do a lot of work for me and research it," the 83-year-old lifelong St. Catharines resident said.

A football star at St. Catharines Collegiate, Clay helped the school win several championships, including the Canada Dry Award as one of Ontario's outstanding schoolboy football linemen in 1960. Mr. Brown began rowing in 1957 at the Collegiate.

"I was asked by some of the rowers who were also on the football team. They asked me 'What do you do. Do you just play football? Why don't you come out and get in shape and try rowing?' So that's what I did."

Three years later, he was representing Canada at the 1960 Rome Summer Olympics.

"I guess a bit of it was luck. I just got there at the right time."

## FEATURED PLAYER

When a young athlete is asked what they want to be when they are older, being a pro athlete is often the answer. For football specifically, the dream and goal is to play at a higher level such as the CFL and NFL. To set oneself up for success, athletes often play at the USports level in Canada, or at colleges in the United States. Rookie linebacker, <u>Jevaun Jacobsen</u> was on the path to playing at a higher level, receiving 18 Division 1 offers to play college football. But when injury struck and he tore his meniscus, he had 17 of those 18 offers revoked and his path quickly shifted. Jevaun's story is one filled with challenges, but also perseverance and we're pleased to highlight Jevaun's journey and comeback story for this month's newsletter.

Jevaun grew up in Vancouver, British Columbia and attended Terry Fox High School. In Grade 11, he travelled down south to attend <u>Clearwater Academy</u>, their program strives to provide students both a strong academic opportunity and an elite football experience, allowing students to achieve their academic and athletic goals. Fellow Gryphon

teammate, <u>Miles La Foucade</u>, attended Clearwater at the same time and it was a great connection for Jevaun when he arrived in Guelph, as he didn't know many other players on the roster.

"When I was told Jevaun was joining the team, I immediately expressed my excitement to Coach. It was awesome to be reunited with him after we had spent some time together down south. Since I met him, he's always shown resilience and positivity which is admirable. He's a strong guy for sure and it's a blessing to share the locker room with him again!" – Miles La Foucade

In the fall of 2020, Jevaun attended the University of Calgary, where he met Pat Sheahan, who is the current offensive line coach for the Gryphons. Another Gryphon connection was Treshaun Abrahams-Webster, who is the current Defensive Assistant coach for the Gryphons.

Jevaun's journey to the University of Guelph was anything but straightforward, but he noted in his conversation with us that he believes everything happened for a reason, and he's grateful for the lessons he learned throughout the process.

"When I lost my D1 offers, in a weird way I was almost relieved and felt like it was the way it was supposed to happen. I'm happy with how all turned out and that I was able to do it on my own terms and make the decision to return to the sport of football."

Jevaun's first home game for the red, black and gold was against the York Lions for Homecoming. A 88-7 victory in front of a sold out crowd for Homecoming was a pretty perfect first home game experience for him at Alumni Stadium.

"Being back on the field was an incredible feeling. It was my first time fully healthy and it pretty much felt like I was back home in a way"

The passion of football is a family affair, as Jevaun's brother (Corey) played in both the NFL and CFL and is the current Defensive Coordinator for the Toronto Argos.

Corey is no stranger to the Gryphon Football program, as the entire Toronto Argonaut organization spends over a month at the U of G campus during the spring for their CFL Training Camp. They utilize all the facilities, and really immerse themselves on campus. Additionally, Corey was a guest speaker at a coaches clinic this past February, which was hosted by the Gryphon Football coaching staff.

"I chatted with my brother quite a bit during the decision-making process, and it happened to be at the time when the Argos were at the U of G for training camp. He assured me that if I was to commit to Guelph, I would be taken care of here. He also highlighted how amazing the facilities are, the high-quality food and the culture of the program."

Corey was able to watch Jevaun play during Game 4 against the McMaster Marauders. Jevaun had an impressive game with a team-high 10 tackles which included 9 solo, 2 assisted, and one for a 5-yard Marauder loss. One of the biggest plays in the game occurred late in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, with Jevaun intercepting the football which led to a turnover and then a touchdown. The Gryphons had a 21-13 victory over the Marauders and Jevaun earned Defensive Player of the game honours.

"Making that play in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter was a big moment for me, it was great to be able to celebrate with the team and look up and see my brother in the stands cheering me on. Corey hadn't seen me play football since I was 15, so it was special to have him there."

Unfortunately for Jevaun, he was only able to play in 2 games for the 2023 season, as he suffered an injury for the remainder of the season. However, Jevaun remained determined and positive, realizing that there was still an important role for him to play in supporting his team.

"The injuries have been tough, but the staff and coaches here have really cultivated a culture here that made me feel supportive. Of course, I wanted to be out on the field playing, but I had to shift my role to being on the sidelines"

Now in the off-season, Jevaun's mindset has shifted to training, getting healthy and stronger, and also building up his resume for his professional career, as he aspires to be a general manager for a pro football team.

"Your playing career can only go so far, so it's important for me to build up my resume, gain experience, and develop those transferable skills. I want to be around football forever, whether that be on or off the field.

Jevaun's dedication and commitment to the Gryphons has not gone unnoticed. His teammates and coaches have praised him for his hard work, positive attitude, and willingness to learn. He has quickly become a valuable member of the team and we are excited to see what the future holds for Jevaun. With his talent and determination, we are certain that he will continue to make a positive impact on the team!





# FEATURED ALUMNUS

This month's featured alumnus is Eric Stranz. Eric was a kicker and punter on the Gryphon football team from 2018 to 2022. He has recently become a coach for the Gryphon Football team. He began as a kicking coach this past season, and stated that he "loves it". Eric describes his coaching experience as a new, unique commitment to the program.

Through his entire journey as a Gryphon football player, Eric recalls his highlight as beating Western in the team's first game back after COVID-19. The final score was 23-21 and the game came down to a final punt. Stranz recovered his own punt to win the game. The cherry on top? It was a home game at Guelph.

Eric studied accounting at the University of Guelph and balanced co-op, a five course workload, and football all at the same time. For that reason, Eric says that "time management and the resources for the players (such as tutoring) were highly valuable".

Having joined the team in 2018, Eric says "everyone made it clear that it was so much more than football; it was a family". He recalls training camp as having been an incredible first step to building comradery.

Another large component of Eric's football experience was his parents' involvement in POP. His parents became POP members right off the bat. He says that "they loved being part of the team as much as [he] did". This made the transition from high school to university much easier for Eric.

One of Stranz' most memorable moments was in Coach Sheahan's first year. He set up a karaoke night at Franks before school had even started and Stranz recalls it being a great bonding experience. He says "seeing everyone in their element was super fun".

As Stranz continues on his new journey as a coach, he hopes to help kickers on the team accomplish their personal goals.








**GRYPHONS GONE PRO**

### Jim Stewart - A Gryphon Lineman's Legacy

In the inaugural edition of "Herd it Here First," we shine the spotlight on Jim Stewart, a dedicated member of the newly-formed Gryphon alumni group known as "The Herd." Jim's journey from an unexpected start at Guelph in 1988 to becoming a proud offensive lineman is a tale of perseverance, camaraderie, and enduring lessons.

Jim, who initially joined Guelph for Human Kinetics, found himself drawn into football at the urging of his dad and high school coach, Rick Allen. From winter workouts as an inside receiver to a tryout as a slot back, Jim discovered his true calling when he took the field as a left guard, weighing in at a lean 265 pounds.

The brotherhood among the offensive linemen became evident quickly, forging friendships that have stood the test of time. For four years, Jim and his fellow linemen played together, forming an unbreakable bond that extends beyond the gridiron. Reflecting on his experience, Jim emphasizes the teamwork intrinsic to the O-Line, an attitude that has guided him throughout his life.

While earning recognition as an OUAA all-star in 1990 and 1992, Jim cherishes the moments that transcend awards—the victories against Western in 1992, the laughter in the locker room, and the camaraderie on and off the field. These memories, he notes, are the true rewards that endure.


Post-Gryphon life led Jim to a decade of high school teaching in Sarnia and a subsequent career in administration. Retired for a year and a half, Jim channels his

passion for fitness, cultivated during his Gryphon days, into Silverback Fitness, a personal training business benefiting athletes of all ages.






## DID YOU KNOW?
