


Introducing our New Leadership, our New Vision, and the New Era


#### **FOGF Endowment Initiated**

## THE HERD IS COMING

#### **HERD Spotted in Quinte**

On February 17, the second Annual Trench Camp for the Quinte Skyhawks Community Football organization took place in Belleville, Ontario, led by Coach Mike MacDonald, who has been with the organization for the past two years since his relocation to the area in 2021. Modeled after the Oline Dline Camp, which Coach Mike and Coach Brian Cluff had previously run for the Gryphons, the camp saw Coach Cluff also coaching at the 1st Annual Trench Camp in 2023.

The camp's objective is to offer a training camp-like experience for players aged 14 to 18, featuring full equipment and contact drills. Notably, former Gryphons currently in the CFL or recently retired from it served as key guest coaches. This year, Herd Alumni Coulter Woodmansey (Hamilton Tiger-Cats), Eric Starzcala (Ottawa Redblacks), Andrew Pickett (former Ottawa Redblacks), Spencer Masterson (Edmonton Elks draft pick 2023), and Kyle Fraser (former Ottawa Redblacks draft pick) coached the Oline Campers, while for the Dline, AJ Allen (Saskatchewan Roughriders), along with current Gryphon Dlinemen Nick Partchenko and Max Barber, took charge.

Despite an initial limit, the camp attracted 50 players, filling up rapidly. The format comprised two practices, one focusing on the run game and the other on the pass game, interspersed with a healthy dinner and a film session akin to Gryphon training camps, where players received corrections based on footage.

A highlight of this year's camp was the signing of two Skyhawk players, Andrew Cumpsty and Caleb Belfry, to Letters of Intent to attend the University of Guelph and play for the Gryphons this fall. Cumpsty, an offensive tackle, was also recognized as the Top Olineman by the guest coaches.

The Herd alumni coaching staff impressed with their guidance, demonstrating techniques and mentoring players through their execution. Coach Mike expressed pride in seeing them give back to the young players with their enthusiasm and dedication.

Coach Peter Gabriel, President of the Skyhawks organization, presented gifts to all guest coaches, conveying the organization's and parents' gratitude for their contributions. It marked a proud moment for the Herd Alumni and Coach Mike, witnessing the bond formed between the organization and the participating young players.

I want to thank Patrick Sutherland for his time and contribution to this month's lesson. Patrick was gracious enough to allow me access to the Ontarion's archives. I am excited to be able to share 72 years of history with you with the help of Patrick and the staff of the Ontarion. This month we are going to delve into the years 2010-2014. This stretch may have been the most successful in Gryphon Football history. Within these years we saw the Gryphons achieve a regular season record of 7-1 three times. Defeat Western regularly during the regular season and the playoffs and punch their tickets to two Yates Cup Championships in 4 years. There was an excitement on campus around the program, the Stadium was given a facelift that included a new rubber track, turf field and checkerboard endzones. We hosted the Ticats and their fans for

a portion of the CFL and we the new look Gryphons sported a new look each week with different combinations of jerseys, pants and helmets. Toted as the Oregon of the North the Gryphons generated excitement across the province and the country, garnering and landing top recruits from all over the country. The Gryphons were on the rise, and it was an exciting time to be a Gryphon. I hope you enjoy this pictural history lesson that spans 2010-2014. Thanks to the staff of the Ontarion for allowing us access to every issue beginning in 1951 with the OAC Aggies then Redmen and right up to today's Gryphons. I hope you enjoy this retrospective and for some of you I hope you enjoy seeing some of these great moments you were a part of. Enjoy.


