What Happened in December?

Coaching Change

After spending the past five seasons serving as head coach of the University of Guelph football program, Ryan Sheahan's time with the Gryphons has come to an end. It was announced on Friday Dec. 15, 2023 that Sheahan has accepted the head coaching position at the University of Calgary.

"We want to thank Ryan for his significant contributions at U of G as the head coach of our football team and wish him well in his next chapter," said University of Guelph, Director of Athletics Scott McRoberts. "We appreciate his time and efforts towards guiding this team through the past five years including through a very difficult time during the pandemic."

Sheahan took over as head coach of the Gryphon football program back in 2019, and over the course of his four seasons of *on-field action with the Gryphons (*with the 2020 season cancelled due to COVID), Sheahan twice led the Gryphons to the OUA semifinal stage (2019 & 2021) while posting a cumulative regular season record of 13-17.

Prior to arriving at the University of Guelph, the Montreal native spent four seasons (2015-18) at the University of Calgary where he served as the Dinos Assistant Head Coach and Offensive Coordinator.

The Gryphons are pleased to announce that current associate coach <u>Mark Surya</u> has been named as the new head coach of the football team. Surya has been with the Gryphons since 2019 and previously held roles with Laurier and Toronto as their offensive coordinator. He becomes the 18th head coach in the history of the Gryphon football program. Surya earned his undergraduate degree in Kinesiology from Queen's University and MSc in Kinesiology from Wilfrid Laurier University.

"We are excited to announce Mark as our new head coach," said McRoberts. "We are fortunate to be getting a coach of his character, coaching acumen, recruiting experience, ability to develop young student-athletes to their full potential and a familiarity with our University, which makes him a perfect match. I look forward to watching his leadership as he guides our Gryphon student-athletes into a new era."

"I am truly honoured for this opportunity to lead the Gryphon football program," Surya said.
"The last five years have laid the foundation for the program, and I look forward to building on the current success and working towards creating an outstanding experience for the student-athletes."

Congratulations to Mark Surya. The players and members of the program couldn't be happier that you are stepping into this role!



The Herd is Coming

Gryphon Gridiron Chronicles: Jake Piotrowski's Journey from the Trenches to the Farm

In the heart of the Gryphon football legacy lies a story of resilience, hard work, and a deep love for the game. Today, we shine the spotlight on one of our own, Jake Piotrowski, a towering force on the offensive line from Shanty Bay, Ontario.

Hailing from Eastview Collegiate in Barrie, Jake graced the Gryphons with his formidable presence from 2009 to 2013. Standing at 6'5" and weighing in at 295 pounds, Jake was more than

just an offensive tackle; he embodied the essence of a Gryphon, a player with grit and determination.

Coach Mike MacDonald vividly recalls his early encounters with Jake, describing him as a special player destined for greatness in the Gryphon colors. "He was the ideal combination of size, strength, and athleticism that an o-line coach dreams of having," Coach MacDonald reminisces.

As Jake matured on the field, he not only became a formidable force in the offensive line but also emerged as a leader within the team. A man of few words but impactful actions, Jake's work ethic and dedication inspired his teammates on and off the field.

In 2012, adversity struck when Jake suffered a shoulder injury, forcing him to sit out the entire season. Despite this setback, his commitment to the team remained unwavering. Coach MacDonald fondly recalls an incident where Jake, unable to contain his enthusiasm during a playoff game, earned a penalty for stepping onto the field to cheer his teammates—a testament to his undying Gryphon spirit.

Despite missing the 2012 season, Jake's prowess on the field caught the attention of the Montreal Alouettes, who drafted him in the 5th round of the 2013 CFL Draft. Returning for his final season with the Gryphons, Jake showcased his skills, earning a spot with the Alouettes after the Gryphons' season concluded.



In his own words, Jake reflects on his time at the University of Guelph: "My time at the University of Guelph playing for the Gryphons was nothing but positive. There were many changes to the coaching staff after my 1st year so many things were up in the air. Stu Lang became head coach, and specifically Mike McDonald slid into the role of my Oline coach. From this point on, the culture was nothing but positive, especially at the o-line position. Coaches encouraged a strong bond at all positions; the o-line was a very tight unit as we spent

a ton of time on and off the field together. This allowed us to succeed as we were able to be all on the same page which is essential for the success of an o-line. Anytime I've been able to go back to Guelph after graduation, you can tell this strong cohesion is still apparent. This is a huge reason for the success of the Guelph football program. I can attribute a lot of my football success after Guelph to the lessons that were instilled in me while I was there. I will forever be grateful to Mike McDonald and Stu Lang for teaching me these important life skills."

Today, Jake Piotrowski is not just a former Gryphon; he's a husband, a father of three, and a proud farmer near Barrie, Ontario. His journey embodies the core values of The Herd—selflessness, perseverance, hard work, team orientation, and a never-give-up attitude.

As we celebrate the legacy of Jake Piotrowski, let's remember the impact he made on and off the field—a true Gryphon through and through.

Anthony played on the team for all 4 years of his General Arts degree, having joined the team at 21 years of age. Upon joining the team and being away from home for the first time, Anthony recalls the older guys on the team as having been "like brothers to him" and has fond memories of them "showing him the ropes".

Through his time at Guelph, Anthony refers to his brother as having been one of his largest inspirations. He says that his brother taught him "important skills such as how to manage [his] time". His brother helped to coach spring training camp and played professionally, contributing to his inspiring nature. Anthony also positively reflects on the help of University programs such as the SAM program, when it came to balancing football and his studies.

Tony had many large accomplishments throughout his time as a player, one of which was receiving the Community Service award at the Wildman. His impressive efforts have continued to be apparent to the program, as today, Tony looks forward to participating in alumni events such as the Alumni Dinner and Golf Tournament. He played in the golf tournament for the first time this past year and referred to it as "a highlight".

When asked about his favourite memories, Tony recounts the tradition of heading to Osmows, a local Shawarma restaurant owned by a former Gryphon, in first year. Being referred to as the "Osmows guy" by his teammates became a badge of honor, symbolizing the camaraderie shared over meals.

Tony has now graduated from police college and has been hired on as a constable in Guelph. This month he will be starting his work in the role and will be working alongside a coach officer. What an accomplishment!

Mr. Casasanta's History Class

Welcome to GFB – 100. Welcome back to GFB - 100. I hope you had a wonderful Christmas and a happy New Year. I am your instructor John Casasanta, your resident Gryphon Football historian. GFB -100 is a master's class where we will delve into interesting and historical facts about all things Gryphon Football. For this month's lesson we will continue with our pictorial retrospective of Gryphon Football. January's focus will be the 1996 Yates Cup Champions. Let's begin with a quick synopsis of that 'Cinderella' season.

The Gryphons were 1-7 in 1995 and were coming off a frustrating season. The 95 Gryphons were a talented group but were hampered with injury, a revolving door of QBs and just plain old bad luck. But this group of Gryphons refused to feel sorry for themselves and as soon as the offseason began and with the bad taste of the 1995 season fresh in their mouths the Gryphons were ready to make the climb and become the champions of the OUA.

Unfortunately, the Gryphons got off to a slow start, with a 1-2 record going into week 4 the Gryphons rebounded and beat U of T to even their record to 2-2. As important as this win was to the Gryphons and their confidence, the week 5 match up vs. York proved to be a season changing contest. Going into the half time of this game the Gryphons trailed York 24-0 and the playoffs were at risk. Coming out of the locker room the Gryphons rallied in the second half and defeated York pushing their record to 3-2 and providing the spark needed to run the table and not look back for the rest of the season.

The Gryphons finished the 96 season with a record of 6-2. A far cry from the 1-7 record from the year before. The momentum heading into the playoffs was amazing and there was a 1984 like buzz surrounding this team. In the playoffs Western was the 1st round opponent on the road, the Gryphons didn't even blink and ran through the Mustangs on their own turf, leaving many of Western's seniors in tears. Next stop Waterloo and the Yates Cup Championship.

November 9th, 1996, in front of a sold-out crowd at Seagram's Stadium in Waterloo the Gryphons and Yates Cup MVP Gerrit Stam ran over the Warriors to win their third Yates Cup 23-13.

This was a dream season for the Gryphons. Finishing 1-7 a year before. The Gryphons had turned things around finishing 6-2 and winning the Yates Cup. With Coach McNally being named CIS Coach of the Year, an honour Coach shared with each of his players. In a selfless act, Coach McNally had his trophy modified and inscribed with the name of each of his players from that special team on the base of the trophy. He also donated this trophy to the program where you can find it today displayed in the pavilion. McNally understood the importance of team first and this selfless act cemented his legacy along with the men who played for him during this magical season. The 96 Gryphons were the definition of team, a team we will never forget.

Thanks to the staff of the Ontarion for allowing us access to every issue beginning in 1951 with the OAC Aggies then Redmen and right up to today's Gryphons. I hope you enjoy this retrospective and for some of you I hope you enjoy seeing some of these great moments you were a part of. Enjoy.
